BYLAW NO. 2013 / 5

A BYLAW TO PROVIDE FOR THE ABATEMENT OF NUISANCES

The Council of the Resort Village of Lumsden Beach (RVLB) in the Province of Saskatchewan enacts as follows:

1. PURPOSE

This Bylaw is to provide for the abatement of nuisances, including property, activities, or things that adversely affect: the safety, health or welfare of people in the neighborhood; people's use and enjoyment of their property; or, the amenity of the neighborhood.

2. **DEFINITIONS**

"Nuisance" means a condition of property, or a thing, or an activity, and includes:

- 1. A building in a dilapidated state of repair and is a danger to public safety.
- 2. Property that is in an untidy and/or unsightly condition.
- 3. Open excavations on property.
- 4. Any refrigerator or freezer accessible by others that does not have its hinges, latches, lid, door(s) removed.
- 5. Junked vehicles: that have no valid license plate attached to it; or is in a rusted, wrecked, partly wrecked, dismantled, partly dismantled, inoperative or abandoned condition, and is located on private or municipal land.

3. RESPONSIBILITY

- 1. The owner of property, including land, buildings, structures and vehicles shall be responsible for carrying out the provisions of this bylaw.
- 2. No person shall cause or permit a nuisance to occur on any property owned by that person.

4. ENFORCEMENT

- 1. The administration and enforcement of this bylaw is delegated to RVLB Council.
- 2. Inspection of property by Council is hereby authorized.
- 3. If Council finds that this bylaw is being contravened, Council may by written order require the owner or occupant of the property to remedy the contravention.
- 4. Council may take whatever actions or measures necessary to remedy a contravention if the written order is not complied with.
- 5. Council may apply taxes to the property in question to cover unpaid expenses and costs associated with remedying the contravention.
